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Message from the Chair

When the Regional government was established in 1973, Regional Municipality of Waterloo's first Chair, Jack Young, knew that steps would need to be taken to preserve the unique heritage from each of the five counties that were joined to create the new municipality. He felt regional government would be best suited to manage our heritage. In the same year, 1973, the Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation (WRHF) was incorporated with a mandate to preserve and promote the unique heritage of Waterloo Region.

WRHF is a non-profit organization that receives its funding through an annual grant from the Region of Waterloo. The Foundation was the first heritage organization in Canada to be established and funded by a regional government. For the past 47 years, WRHF has helped to direct these public funds towards heritage projects in Waterloo Region.

Over the years, the Foundation has evolved, but their focus has always been on preserving our heritage and recognizing leaders in heritage projects. The board of directors is comprised of 12 members – 10 elected members at large from the region, a regional councillor and the Regional Chair. The board meets nine times a year to discuss grant applications and to identify individuals, organizations and companies that deserve to be recognized for their work preserving and growing our region's heritage. Grants are given for heritage property restorations and for creating and spreading knowledge of our heritage through events, written word and multi-media. Awards are presented to educators and stewards of our heritage. We believe that these people and organizations deserve public recognition for their works.

Since 1973, WRHF has followed Regional Chair Jack Young's vision to preserve heritage and provide ways in which people can be educated about our Region's past, present and future. WRHF board members provide advice, guidance and encouragement to those seeking grants. The board also receives knowledge and inspiration from those who we recognize through our awards.

Of course, many of these projects may not have happened, or may not have been as elaborate without the financial backing that WRHF has provided through project grants. To date the Foundation has distributed over \$1.5 million to Regional heritage projects. We hope to continue funding projects and recognizing heritage leaders for years to come.

The Allocations and Finance (A&F) sub-committee has the unique responsibility of carefully reviewing all applications submitted for grant funding and making recommendations to the Foundation's Board of Directors. The 2019-2020 year has once again proven to be unique for the A&F sub-committee; not only did A&F welcome brand new members to the committee after the Foundation reviewed its Letters Patent, but also, after reviewing dozens of applications for Capital, Publication and Project Grants, the Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation approved funding for only a few projects.

The first half of A&F's year was spent working with grant applicants to ensure that they were fully aware of the scope of their projects as well as helping them investigate all proheritage avenues available at their disposal. The second half of our year became more challenging as we were all faced with the reality of Social Distancing. Owing to this unique situation, many grant applications that were received within the past few months had to be tabled until we could resume meetings (via virtual means) and are currently under review.

Although sometimes challenging, more often than not the members of A&F volunteer to be on this sub-committee owing to their passion for preserving the architectural, cultural and aesthetic heritage of Waterloo Region and the rewarding experience it generates. As a result, we are discovering new ways to work with grant applicants in order to ensure that concerns are addressed and clarity is available at all stages of the application process. Awards of Excellence

The Awards of Excellence are intended to recognize outstanding contributions by individuals, institutions and organizations to heritage preservation in Waterloo Region, in such areas as archaeological, archival, cultural, education, genealogical, historical, individual, literary, media, natural, other. The program began in 1983.

Sally Thorsen Award of Excellence

This award of excellence was created in 1998 in honor of the former commissioner of the Planning and Culture Department for the Region of Waterloo. This award maybe presented to only one person in a year who has demonstrated, in the course of at least ten years of their professional lives, an outstanding level of commitment to heritage concerns.

Dr. Jean Steckle Award of Heritage Education

This award for excellence in heritage education is presented to an individual who has demonstrated leadership in heritage education through teaching, writing or by example, and who has encouraged and mentored others in the understanding and appreciation of the natural or cultural heritage of Waterloo Region.

Region of Waterloo History Prize

Founded in 2013, the Region of Waterloo History Prize is awarded to a piece of work published within the previous 5 years which has helped to educate and promote the

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heritage of the Waterloo Region through the published work. The Region of Waterloo History prize may be considered for a piece of work presented in any format, including, but not limited to a book, movie, article, play etc.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Directors of Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation

We have audited the financial statements of The Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation (the Entity), which comprise:

- the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2019
- the statement of revenues and expenses for the year then ended
- and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies

(Hereinafter referred to as the "financial statements").

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Entity as at December 31, 2019, and its results of operations for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the "Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements" section of our auditors' report.

We are independent of the Entity in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audit of the financial statements in Canada and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.



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Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Entity's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Entity or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Entity's financial reporting process.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion.

Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists.

Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.

We also:

 Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.

Our conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of our auditors' report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Entity to cease to continue as a going concern.

Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2019

Purpose of Foundation:

The Waterloo Regional Heritage Foundation is primarily a grant making organization which supports heritage initiatives in Waterloo Region. Its primary purpose is to preserve and financially assist in the preservation of heritage landmarks, historical buildings and other projects of historical significance to the Region of Waterloo.

1. Significant accounting policies:

These financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada Handbook Part III - Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations. The Foundation's significant accounting policies are as follows:

(a) Basis of accounting:

The accrual basis of accounting is used for financial reporting

(b) Fixed assets:

The historical cost and accumulated depreciation of fixed assets is not reported. Expenses of a capital nature are charged against revenues in the year they are incurred.

2. Investments:

In 1994, the Heritage Foundation transferred its investment funds to the Regional Municipality of Waterloo. The funds invested are due on demand and bear interest based on the net percentage earned by the Regional Municipality of Waterloo. Interest is paid monthly.

3. Grants committed:
